

Appropriations for education-related programs and support in Build Back Better proposals

	American Families Plan (4/28/21)	American Jobs Plan (3/31/21)
Universal Pre-K for 3- and 4-year-olds	\$200 billion for a partnership with states to offer free high-quality preschool to all 3- and 4-year-olds, prioritizing high-need areas and benefitting 5 million children.	
Community college	\$109 billion to offer tuition-free community college for all.	\$12 billion for technological and physical infrastructure needs at community colleges and to increase community college access in education “deserts.”
Pell Grants	\$80+ billion to increase the maximum Pell grant by up to \$1400 (21%).	
Other college affordability and completion proposals	\$62 billion for a new program to strengthen student retention at institutions of higher education that serve disadvantaged communities; \$39 billion for HBCUs, Minority-Serving Institutions, Tribally Controlled Universities to provide 2 years tuition-free for students with family income below \$125k, and \$5 billion for institutional aid for these IHEs; \$2 billion for graduate programs for skilled health workers.	
Teacher training	\$9 billion to train more teachers to address shortages and increase diversity.	
School modernization and construction		\$100 billion to upgrade and build new schools, with priority for safety upgrades
Workforce development		\$100 billion in total: \$40 billion for a new Dislocated Worker Program; \$12 billion to help workers facing the greatest challenges; and \$48 billion in workforce development and worker protections.
Broadband		\$100 billion to expand broadband access.
